Dear Friends of CASA,

As I come to the end of my first year as president of CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) of Will County, I am constantly amazed at the passion of our staff, volunteers and my fellow members of the Board of Directors who work so hard for the children in our community.

I'm also so happy to have seen so many of you who support CASA with your time and financial donations. We could not do what we do without your help. This year we continued to see an increase in the number of volunteers who went through our training program and were sworn in to serve as advocates.

As those of you who have served in this capacity are aware, this is a volunteer opportunity unlike most others. It requires not only training and dedication but also a willingness to become closely involved with an abused or neglected child who, without your advocacy on his or her behalf, would be voiceless in our court system. These are children who have been physically or emotionally abused or neglected by their parents for a variety of reasons and, at the court's direction, are appointed a CASA to represent them as their family navigates the juvenile court system, a process that can be frightening and filled with uncertainty.

Having an advocate whom they can trust and will speak up on behalf of their best interests makes all the difference in their lives and in their future. So I am grateful for all of you who have become advocates in the last year, and to the many, many more who have gone before you. If you are reading this and have ever thought about becoming a CASA advocate, I encourage you to contact us if you have any questions and consider attending our next training session in January. Please visit the "Training" page of our website for more information and training dates.

I realize volunteering in this capacity isn't for everyone, so thank you to those of you who help out at our fundraising events, either by volunteering, sponsoring or participating. These are all ways that you can support our program, and all are vitally important.

In closing, I'm going to ask you to do one more thing -- please tell someone about CASA of Will County. We can't grow and reach 100% of the children in need unless more people support our cause. So invite someone to one of our events, tell a friend about becoming an advocate or consider making a year-end donation. There are so many ways to make a difference in a child's life, and we are so thankful that you do.










#### Percentage of ethnicity





#### MIA AND ZACH ENJOY A HAPPY HAVEN

Early this September, Mia (age 4) and Zach (age 2) arrived at River Valley Justice Center for the fourth time in mere weeks. Each time they arrived, they were unsure of their fate – would they get to go home, or would they be placed into foster care? Mia was extremely anxious about the situation and repeatedly asked for her daddy. Unshed tears glistened in the corners of her eyes.

Our staff member, Kaitlin, immediately stepped in: "Would you like to see our garden, Mia? There's butterflies!" Mia and Zach excitedly followed Kaitlin outside, where an impromptu picnic was held using oranges, pretzels, and bottled water from the office. As Mia and Zach looked around the garden, you could see their tense posture relax. Both Mia and Zach excitedly went from flower to flower, touching them gently and breathing in their scents. Soon, Mia was naming butterflies: "This one is Elsa! And this one is Ms. Sue!" She also named her favorite plant, "Sugar." As time passed in the garden, the children giggled and played. It was clear to see that the garden had worked wonders on their nerves, and they were finally able to relax.

Luckily, Mia and Zach's story has a happy ending: They were able to go home with their grandparents. By the time court had ended and the children were ready to go home, over four hours had passed. Without the gift of our Children's Garden, which was made possible by donations from generous community partners, those four hours would have passed slowly for the children in the clinical atmosphere of an office. Instead, they were able to relax and enjoy a carefree morning playing throughout the garden and dancing with the butterflies.



#### CASA CHILDREN'S GARDEN THRIVES

Thanks to the awe-inspiring job of Nancy Kuhajda and her team of master gardeners, our garden is flourishing and proving to be a haven to nature's most delicate wildlife. Numerous butterflies can be seen fluttering throughout the garden, but on September 10, one of our master gardeners happened to see a monarch butterfly that had been reared, tagged, and released in Plainfield, IL! We at CASA are honored to provide temporary sanctuary not only to the butterflies, but to the fragile children who find themselves waiting with us just as Mia and Zach did while the court attempts to give them hope for a better future.











As you read in the letter from our President Clay Johnson, there are a number of ways that you can support CASA of Will County, through your time (as an advocate) and through your financial support. Here's what that means to the program.

Imagine the child who has been harmed through no fault of their own. It costs \$1,000 to provide a CASA advocate for that child for an entire year. Last year we did a great job in serving 331 children in Will County. That number represents 60 percent of all children who came into care, leaving nearly 200 who were left behind to navigate the court system without an advocate because we lacked the funding to reach them.

It would take an additional \$100,000 for us to reach our goal of serving 100 percent of the children in need. That amount is also the equivalent of nearly THREE additional case managers to oversee those children. That is a lot of money, but it is attainable with people like you to be a friend to those children in need.

So how do we achieve our goal? Just as we have all along – step by step. Imagine that the children we are currently unable to serve are the kids in your neighborhood, your children's classmates and friends. In fact, your children. *These children belong to all of us.* 

We ask now . . . who among you is willing to be a friend to those children in need? Can you sponsor a child? Please consider your pledge based on your ability to give, taking into consideration the following:

- \$1.000 =One child for 12 months
- \$500 = One child for six months
- \$250 = One child for three months (or one quarter-year)

Or, perhaps you can sponsor more than one child. Any amount you can give will help. #### Help an Abused or Neglected Child

# Volunteer Today!

Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) is a trained volunteer who is appointed by the Juvenile Court Judge to represent the best interests of an abused or neglected child.

CASA volunteers are appointed as Guardian ad Litems (GALs) and act as the eyes and ears of the Judge by documenting each child's circumstances and making recommendations for services and permanency. The ultimate goal of the CASA advocate is to help ensure that every child lives in a safe and permanent home. This could mean reunification with their parents, placement with relatives, or adoption by a loving family.





### The Role of CASA

#### What are the requirements to be a CASA/GAL?

- Anyone 25 years of age or older with good communication and writing skills is welcome to apply (*bilingual volunteers needed!*)
- Pass DCFS and criminal background checks
- Attend 35 hours of training

#### What are the expectations of a CASA/GAL?

- Visit children at least monthly
- Interview everyone involved in the child's life
- Prepare written court reports with findings and recommendations and attend court
- Complete 12 hours of in-service training annually

CASA of Will County strives to contribute positive outcomes in the lives of mistreated children. CASA advocates are well-supported by case management, staff, and mentors.
